THE FIJIAN WARRIOR ALWAYS CHOSE A CLUB THAT SUITED HIS STATURE AND NATURAL MOVEMENTS AND HE USED DIFFERENT WEAPONS FOR DIFFERENT TYPES OF BLOW. STRIKERS OR CRUSHERS, AS IN THIS EXAMPLE, WERE USED WITH A DOWNWARD SMASHING MOTION.

IN THE USE OF ALL WEAPONS THE MANNER OF KILLING AND NOT JUST THE KILLING ITSELF WAS OF GREAT IMPORTANCE. EVEN AFTER THE INTRODUCTION OF MUSKETS TO THE ISLANDS THE TRADITIONAL CLUB WAS PREFERRED SINCE IT WAS NOT JUST A WEAPON, BUT A WORK OF ART, A MARK OF RANK, A SYMBOL OF MANHOOD, AND A REPOSITORY OF ACCUMULATED 'MANA'. THESE QUALITIES WERE NOT EASILY TRANSFERRED TO A FOREIGN COLONIAL METAL MUSKET AND UNLIKE NEW ZEALAND THE NUMBER OF WAR CASUALTIES DID NOT INCREASE WITH THEIR INTRODUCTION.
