IN THE 1830'S THE ETHNIC CLEANSING OF THE SOUTH-EASTERN AND MID-WESTERN STATES BY THE AMERICAN GOVERNMENT CREATED A MELTING POT OF DIVERSE NATIVE AMERICAN ART TRADITIONS ALONG THE MISSOURI RIVER AND IN PRESENT DAY OKLAHOMA. UNRELENTING GOVERNMENT EFFORTS TO DESTROY THE NATIVE CULTURES MET WITH A STUBBORN RESISTANCE. RESULTING FROM INTENSIFIED INTERTRIBAL CONTACTS A NEW STYLE OF BEADWORK EMERGED. SHARED BY LOCAL AND IMMIGRANT TRIBES ALIKE THIS 'PRAIRIE STYLE', WHICH IS CHARACTERIZED BY STYLISED FLORAL AND ABSTRACT FORMS, REFLECTED THE NATIVE WILLINGNESS TO SACRIFICE TRIBAL DISTINCTIONS IN ORDER TO MAINTAIN AN 'INDIAN' IDENTITY.
