THE PREPARATION OF THESE BUDDHIST TRUMPETS IS ACCOMPANIED BY ELABORATE INCANTATION AND RITUAL.

BUDDHIST'S BELIEVE THAT THEY HARNESS THE ENERGY OF THE WIND BY BLOWING TRUMPETS WHICH THEN CALL ON,

AND WARN THE SPIRITS OF THE IMPENDING CEREMONIALS.

THESE TRUMPETS ARE USED IN MANY RELIGIOUS CEREMONIES BUT ARE USED ESPECIALLY FOR EXORCISING DEMONS, AND THE HUMAN BONE IS INTENDED TO REMIND BOTH THE PLAYER AND LISTENER OF HIS OWN IMPERMANENCE AND TRANSIENT EXISTENCE.
