LITERATURE

THE TERM ESKIMO DERIVES ORIGINALLY FROMA A CREE INDIAN WORD MEANING 'EATERS OF RAW FLESH'. IT HAS BEEN ADOPTED BY MOST ESKIOMS EXCEPT THOSE FROM NORTHERN CANADA WHO PREFER THE INUPIAK TERM 'INUIT', MEANING PEOPLE.

ANIMALS, IMPORTANT IN MYTH AND AS A SOURCE OF FOOD AND RAW MATERIALS OCCUR FREQUENTLY IN ESKIMO AND INUIT ART. THE CARVINGS WERE ATTACHED TO HUNTING EQUIPMENT, RITUAL OBJECTS OR WORN AS PERSONAL AMULETS AND USED TO PLACATE THE ANIMAL SPIRITS FOR PAST CATCHES, THUS ASSURING A PLENTIFUL SUPPLY OF GAME IN THE FUTURE.
