JOHN THE BAPTIST WAS AN IMMENSELY POPULAR FIGURE IN THE MIDDLE AGES AND IN ENGLAND NO FEWER THAN 496 ANCIENT CHURCHES WERE DEDICATED IN HIS HONOUR. THE MONASTIC ORDERS HAVE ALWAYS HELD HIM IN HIGH REGARD AS BY HIS SOLITARY AND AUSTERE LIFE IN THE DESERT, HE WAS CONSIDERED A MONK HIMSELF. IN ART HE IS REPRESENTED BOTH AS A PROPHET AND A BAPTISER AND HIS ASSOCIATION WITH BAPTISM MADE HIM A FAMILIAR FIGURE WITH THE ORDINARY MAN OF MEDIEVAL EUROPE. HIS IMAGE WAS FREQUENTLY SEEN ON WALL PAINTINGS, STAINED GLASS WINDOWS, BENCH ENDS AND STATUES.
