THE PLAINS INDIANS WERE NOWADIC EQUESTRIAN HUNTERS AND LIFE ON THE MOVE PROHIBITED HEAVY POSSESSIONS.

MOST THINGS WERE STORED AND KEPT IN LIGHT-WEIGHT WATERPROOF AND DURABLE SKIN CONTAINERS. THE HIDES

WERE READILY AVAILABLE FROM THE NUMEROUS ANIMALS HUNTED FOR FOOD AND WERE DECORATED BY INCISING,

SCRAPING, PAINTING, QUILLING AND BEADING AND THE AWL WAS A NECESSITY TO PIECE AND PRICK HOLES IN THE HIDE.
