LITERATURE

THE EXTREMELY POPULAR CUSTOM OF BETEL NUT CHEWING WAS PRACTISED IN MANY AREAS OF MELANESIA. THE BETEL MIXTURE WAS COMPOSED OF THE NUT OF THE ARECA PALM, THE FRUIT OR LEAVES OF THE BETEL PEPER AND THE LIME PRODUCED BY BURNING CORAL OR SHELL. THE NUT WAS SOMETIMES POUNDED TO A POWDER. THE LIME WAS STORED IN CONTAINERS SUCH AS THESE FINE EXAMPLES AND TAKEN WITH THE SPATULA MADE OF WOOD, BONE OR SHELL. THESE EXAMPLES ARE OF CARVED WOOD WITH FIGURATIVE FINIALS PROBABLY REPRESENTING ANCESTORS.
