LITERATURE

THE SEPIK RIVER WINDS OVER ROUGHLY 1100 KILOMETRES DOWN TO THE COAST WITH 8 DIFFERENT TRIBUTARIES JOINING THE MAIN RIVER THAT FLOWS DOWN FROM THE CENTRAL AND COASTAL MOUNTAIN RANGES. HARD WOOD SCULPTURE FROM THE AREAS OF THE MIDDLE AND LOWER SEPIK, AND THE MOUTH OF THE RIVER, ARE CONSIDERED TO BE THE PRIME ARTISTIC EXPRESSION OF THE REGION SURPASSING ALL OTHERS. THESE MINIATURE AMULETIC MASKS WERE OFTEN USED TO DECORATE BUSH STRING BAGS KNOWN AS 'BILUMS', WHICH MEN USED TO CARRY PERSONAL ORNAMENTS, MAGICAL SUBSTANCES AND BETEL CHEWING EQUIPMENT.
