FROM THE LATE 17TH CENTURY TO THE LATE 19TH CENTURY STAY BUSKS WERE USED AS STIFFENERS FOR INSERTING IN A WOMAN'S CORSET OR CORSAGE AND IT CONTINUED TO BE THE CUSTOM TO CARVE AND PRESENT STAY BUSKS AS LOVE TOKENS AS LONG AS THE VAGARIES OF FASHION DECREED A WASP WAIST ACCENTUATED BY A LONG POINTED BODICE. STAY BUSKS WERE POPULAR WITH SAILORS AS A SCRIMSHAW ITEM BECAUSE, AS THEY WERE SHAPED FROM THE PAN BONE OF A WHALE, THEY PROVIDED A FLAT EVEN SURFACE THAT COULD BE EASILY ENGRAVED.
