THE STONEMASONS WOULD TAKE THEIR INSPIRATION FROM MEDIEVAL ILLUMINATED MANUSCRIPTS, BESTIARIES AND THE BIBLE FOR THEIR CARVINGS HOPING TO INSTIL TERROR INTO THE SINNING OBSERVER AND GUIDE HIM ONTO A VIRTUOUS PATH.
