## LITERATURE

BEFORE EUROPEAN INFLUENCE THE AUSTRALIAN ABORIGINAL PEOPLES HABITUALLY WENT NAKED REQUIRING NO CLOTHES DURING THE HOT DAY AND STAVING OFF THE COLD AT NIGHT BY SLEEPING AROUND FIRES OR HUDDLING TOGETHER FOR MUTUAL WARMTH WITH RELATIVES AND DOGS.

THESE PEARL SHELL ORNAMENTS WERE, HOWEVER, REGARDED AS GARMENTS BY THE MEN WHO WORE THEM SUSPENDED FROM A HUMAN HAIR CORD AROUND THEIR WAISTS AS PUBIC COVERS. THE APPARENTLY PURELY GEOMETRICAL DESIGNS HAVE TOTEMIC SIGNIFICANCE WITH SOME SPECIMENS SHOWING EMU TRACKS OR HUMAN FIGURES. THEY COULD ONLY BE WORN BY THE INITIATED AND ALTHOUGH ORIGINATING IN THE KIMBERLEY REGION THEY WERE TRADED ACROSS VAST DISTANCES.
