LITERATURE

THE TERM 'NAGA' ORIGINALLY MEANT 'NAKED' AND WAS USED BY THE ASSAMESE FOR THE HILL PEOPLE LIVING HIGH UP
IN THE MOUNTAINS. IT WAS ALSO A BLANKET TERM THAT WAS UNFORTUNATELY ADOPTED BY THE BRITISH AND
PREVIOUSLY USED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE PLAINS, WHICH HAD PEJORATIVE CONNOTATIONS AND MEANT 'WILDMAN' OR
'BARBARIAN'. THE CENSUS OFFICIALS AND ADMINISTRATORS OF POST-COLONIAL INDIA ALSO USED THE NAME, BUT NOW
THE NAGAS WANT TO BE IDENTIFIED BY THEIR SPECIFIC TRIBAL NAMES SUCH AS ANGAM, AO, CHAKESANG, SEMA, RENGMA
AND TANGKHUL.
