LITERATURE

DESPITE THE FERTILITY OF THE NILE VALLEY TIMBER WAS ALWAYS A PRECIOUS COMMODITY IN ANCIENT EGYPT. MANY TREES WERE GROWN FOR THEIR FRUIT SUCH AS THE DATE PALMAND FIG, BUT THEY WERE ALSO USED FOR BUILDING AND THE CONSTRUCTION OF FURNITURE. THE TAWARISK AND THE SYCAMORE FIG WERE BOTH WIDELY USED FOR THE MAKING OF COFFINS AS WELL AS FOR CARVING INTO STATUARY. ASH WAS SOMETIMES USED FOR WEAPONS, PARTICULARLY THOSE REQUIRING FLEXIBILITY. THE FINEST WOOD USED BY THE EGYPTIANS WAS IMPORTED CEDAR FROM THE LEBANON AND THIS WAS MUCH USED FOR MAKING THE VERY BEST COFFINS.
