A SERIES OF DOTS DOWN THE SHAFT PROBABLY INDICATING SUCCESSFUL COMBAT STRIKES

COMPARABLE TO A EUROPEAN MACE, CLUBS SUCH AS THIS WERE DESIGNED TO INFLICT A LETHAL CRUSHING BLOW TO THE HEAD. TO SLAY AN ENEMY WITH A CLUB AT CLOSE QUARTERS BROUGHT MORE PRESTIGE THAN ANY OTHER FORM OF COMBAT AND EARNED THE WARRIOR THE COVETED STATUS OF 'KOROI' OR KILLER. LIKE THE SWORDS OF MEDIEVAL EUROPE AND JAPAN, FIJIAN CLUBS WERE OFTEN GIVEN INDIVIDUAL NAMES REFERRING TO THEIR DESTRUCTIVE POWERS. IN 1858 THE MISSIONARY THOMAS WILLIAMS WROTE 'Â€|THOSE CLUBS WHICH BELONG TO DISTINGUISHED WARRIORS HAVE EMPHATIC NAMESÂ€| KADIGA NI DAMUNI, DAMAGING BEYOND HOPEÂ€| NA TAGI KA KERE BOLE, THE WEEPING (FOR THE DEAD I SLEW).'
