THE DEPICTION OF SAINT PETER HAS BEEN CONSISTENT DOWN THE AGES: A SQUARE FACE AND CURLY BEARD WITH EITHER SHORT HAIR OR BALD AND TONSURED. THE GRAVE AND NATURALISTIC FACE CARVED WITH HIGH CHEEKBONES SUGGEST THAT IT IS THE HEAD OF SAINT PETER. THE EYES ARE WIDE OPEN AND PRECISELY CARVED AS BEFITS ONE OF THE TWELVE APOSTLES.

THE TWELVE MEN PICKED BY CHRIST TO BE HIS APOSTLES AND HIS COMPANIONS STOOD IN AN ELEVATED POSITION.

THEY WERE GIVEN THE POWER TO EXERCISE DEMONS, CURE DISEASE AND INFIRMITY, AND ULTIMATELY TO ASSIST

CHRIST IN JUDGMENT OVER HUMANITY. TWELVE WAS A SYMBOLIC NUMBER FOR WHEN GOD MADE HIS FIRST COVENANT

WITH ISRAEL IT WAS DIMDED INTO TWELVE TRIBES. THE TWELVE APOSTLES STOOD IN PLACE OF THESE TWELVE TRIBES.
