THE GURO PEOPLE LIVE SURROUNDED BY FOREST AND SAVANNAH NEAR THE BAULE AND YAURE WHO LIVE TO THE WEST. THEY WERE ORIGINALLY CALLED KWENI, BUT THE INVADING FRENCH GAVE THEM THE BAULE NAME OF GURO DURING THEIR COLONISATION OF THE CÍTE D'IVOIRE BETWEEN 1906 AND 1912.

THE PULLEY FROM WHICH THE DOUBLE HEDDLES OF THE MEN'S HORIZONTAL WEAMING LOOM ARE SUSPENDED HAS PROMDED THE LOCAL SCULPTOR'S WITH THE OPPORTUNITY OF CREATING THESE WORKS OF ART THAT DEPICT HUMAN HEADS OR FACES. CONTINUAL HANDLING AND USAGE BY THE TEXTILE WEAVER GIVES THE HEDDLE PULLEY ITS RICH PATINA
