LITERATURE

HERACLES WAS A POPULAR FIGURE WITH THE ANCIENT GREEKS, WHO HAD A CONSPICUOUS PREDILECTION FOR SEMDIMNE HEROES. HE WAS THE GREATEST OF THE HEROES IN GREEK MYTHOLOGY AND OF ALL HIS MYTHICAL CONTEMPORARIES: PERSEUS, THESEUS, JASON OR ASCLEPIUS, HE BECAVE THE CLOSEST TO FULL DIMNE HONOURS. UNUSUALLY HE HAD NO GRAVE AND SO HIS REMAINS DID NOT BELONG TO ANY ONE CITY OR STATE, FROM THE FUNERAL PYRE HE TRANSLATED DIRECTLY TO MOUNT OLYMPUS. WITHOUT HESITATION THE ROMANS LATER ADOPTED HIM AS HERCULES, THE POWERFUL GOD OF PHYSICAL STRENGTH WHO WAS ESPECIALLY WORSHIPPED BY THE ROMAN LEGIONS.
