LITERATURE

CEREMONIAL ADZE WERE CARRIED OVER THE SHOULDER BY LUBA DIGNITARIES AND WERE SYMBOLS OF THE LEGITIMACY AND DIGNITY OF A CHIEF, OR OF A DIVNER CELEBRATING THEIR IMPORTANCE AS AN ADVISOR TO A PERSON IN AUTHORITY. ONCE HAVING A FORGED FLAT IRON BLADE PROTRUDING FROM THE HEAD, THIS CEREMONIAL TOOL WAS AN EMBLEM OF LEADERSHIP AND AN INDICATOR OF STATUS. THOSE ADZE MADE FOR DIVNERS WERE NOT EMBELLISHED WITH FIGURATIVE ELEMENTS SUCH AS THE CARVED FEMALE HEADS WHICH WERE OFTEN ASSOCIATED WITH KINGSHIP AND ROYAL AUTHORITY.

IN LUBA SOCIETY THE ENLIGHTENMENT, COUNSEL AND THERAPEUTIC BENEFITS AFFORDED BY DIVNERS PROVIDED AN ESSENTIAL COMPLEMENT TO THE LEGISLATIVE ROLE OF THE GOVERNING ELITE. THE STATUS AND RANK OF THE LUBA DIVNERS AS ADVISORS TO ROYAL AND CHIEFLY AUTHORITY IS SHOWN BY THEIR OWNERSHIP OF THESE FINE CEREMONIAL ADZE.
