THE HANDLES OF EATING KNIVES BECAME MUCH MORE ELEGANT AND DECORATIVE IN THE 17TH CENTURY AND CHANGES TO THE SHAPE OF THE BLADE OCCURRED WHEN EATING HABITS DICTATED IT WAS NO LONGER NECESSARY TO SPIKE FOOD WITH A KNIFE, SO THE BLADE BECAME SHORTER WITH THE SHARP POINT REMOVED.

AS DINING CEREMONY AND CUISINE CHANGED SO DID THE NATURE, PROMSION AND USE OF CUTLERY WHETHER IT WAS FOR THE DISPLAY OF LARGESSE AND POWER, THE CEMENTING OF POLITICAL OR BUSINESS AFFINITIES OR THE ENJOYMENT OF THE COMPANY AND CONVERSATION OF FRIENDS. DURING THE 16TH CENTURY CUTLERY WAS USED AT TABLE FOR SERVING FOOD RATHER THAN FOR EATING IT. HOWEVER, DURING THE NEXT CENTURY THIS BEGAN TO BE SUPERSEDED ONCE THE USE OF FORKS BECAME THE FASHION.
