LITERATURE

THE ANCIENT SITE OF TUNA EL GEBEL (TOUNA) LIES TO THE WEST OF HERMOPOLIS MAGNA AND IS COMPOSED OF THREE SECTIONS: A GRAECO-ROMAN NECROPOLIS, THE SACRED ANIMAL CATACOMBS AND TEMPLE OF THOTH TO THE SOUTH AND A 6TH CENTURY AD SETTLEMENT TO THE NORTH, WITH CEMETERIES OF VARIOUS DATES. THERE ARE SURWING REMAINS OF THE BUILDINGS CONSTRUCTED TO ACCOMMODATE THE NUMEROUS ANCIENT PILGRIMS VISITING THE SITE. AS IT WAS OF IMPORTANCE IT ATTRACTED PRIVATE BURIALS INCLUDING ABOUT SIXTY BRICK BUILT FUNERARY HOUSES AND NINE LIMESTONE TOMB CHAPELS, MANY OF PTOLEMAIC AND ROMAN DATE. THE NAMES OF SOME OF THE OWNERS OF THESE 'FUNERARY HOUSES' AND TOMB CHAPELS ARE KNOWN INCLUDING ISADORA (CIRCA AD 150), A WOMAN WHO IS SAID TO HAVE DROWNED IN THE NILE AND SUBSEQUENTLY BECAME THE OBJECT OF A POPULAR CULT. THE PRIVATE TOMB OF THE CHIEF PRIEST OF THOTH CALLED PETOSIRIS (CIRCA 300 B.C.) IS REGARDED AS THE MOST IMPORTANT
