AESTHETICALLY PLEASING AND ARTISTICALLY FASCINATING, THE ART OF TURNING IVORY ON A LATHE TO PRODUCE VARYING GEOMETRICAL SHAPES WAS EXTREMELY POPULAR IN THE NORTHERN COURTS OF EUROPE. PRACTISED AS A

FORM OF LEISURE ACTIVITY BY THE ARISTOCRACY, IT WAS A MAJOR DOMESTIC ART FORM COMPARABLE PERHAPS WITH EMBROIDERY. THE TRADITION DATED BACK TO THE 16TH AND 17TH CENTURIES WHEN IVORY TURNING WAS PATRONISED BY ROYALTY. CHRISTOF ANGERMAIR (1580 - 1633) WAS THE COURT TURNER TO MAXIMILIAN, ELECTOR OF BAVARIA, AND WAS HELD IN SUCH HIGH ESTEEM BY HIS MASTER THAT HE WAS ALLOWED TO MARRY INTO THE NOBLE FAMILY.
